SPEAKERS' PROFILE



Professor Margaret Hay, PhD

Margaret Hav is the inaugural Director of the Monash Institute for Health and Clinical Education, and Director of Student Admissions for the Faculty of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences Monash University Australia, where she is using her global network to develop and deliver short and award units for health professionals. Her work in admissions extends across implementation, research, and governance roles. She holds an adjunct Associate Professor position with the Massachusetts General Hospital Institute of Health Professions, and is a course advisor and member of faculty for three Harvard Macy Institute courses in Boston, USA. She also teaches into courses delivered by Partners International for the National Health Group and SingHealth, Singapore. Margaret is on the course advisory committee for the Harvard Medical School Master's in Medical Education degree, and an invited member of the Association of Medical Educators Europe (AMEE) Research Committee. Prior to her current appointment she was Director, MBBS Admissions, Director, MBBS Assessment and Convenor of Years 1 and 2 of the Monash MBBS program. She has supervised to completion 15 doctoral students. Her research interests in health professions education are in Admissions and Assessment, particularly in the areas of tool design, predictive validity and tool performance, and assessing the impact of professional development courses on career paths in the health professions. She currently chairs the UMAT Test Management Committee and was formally on the GAMSAT Policy Committee. She has won a number of teaching prizes, and was the recipient of the Dean's Award for Teaching Innovation, 2011 for her work in MBBS Assessment.



Professor Parasakthi Navaratnam, MBBS, MSc, FRCPath, GCHE

Parasakthi Navaratnam is the Assessment Lead for the MBBS program and Professor of Medical Microbiology at Monash University Malaysia. In her role as Assessment Lead, she oversees the implementation and quality assurance of assessment processes across the five-year MBBS program. Her previous appointment was Professor and Senior Consultant Microbiologist in the Department of Medical Microbiology, University of Malaya where she was actively involved in the undergraduate MBBS course and postgraduate Master of Pathology (Medical Microbiology) program.



Dr Victor Lee, MBBS, MHPE

Victor Lee graduated from medical school at the University of Melbourne in 1994. He completed his Fellowship of the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine in 2003 and practices as an Emergency Physician. He obtained his Graduate Certificate in Health Professional Education at Monash University, HealthPEER in 2009 which helped to broaden his expertise in medical education. Soon after, he became a member of the Australasian College for Emergency Medicine's (ACEM) Training and Assessment Review Working Group and then the ACEM Curriculum Review Project's Chair of Workplace-based Assessment Working Party. Dr Lee gained valuable experience with leading medical education culture change and implementation of a Competency-based Medical Education program for postgraduate Emergency Medicine Training in Australia and New Zealand. He has also completed his Master of Health Professional Education at Monash University (2015) and published his thesis entitled "Factors impacting on Mini-CEX assessor judgements in Australian and New Zealand Emergency Departments: A mixed methods exploratory study". Dr Lee is currently Co-Director of Emergency Medicine Training at Austin Hospital, member of the ACEM Court of Examiners and Examinations Subcommittee.
